We have been able to order a specialist cuddle bed thanks to the Kirby Foundation. A cuddle bed is an important initiative to improve the end of life care we provide. These extra wide and adaptable hospital beds will enable patients to lie next to their loved one at the hospice, whether that's husbands, wives, partners, children, grandchildren, grandparents or friends.



Family Carer Dementia training

Thanks to a local grant from Nova Livewell our Admiral Nurse has been able to create and deliver two training courses for family carers who are supporting someone living with dementia. The courses were a huge hit and we received some really lovely feedback, we will be looking to raise further funding to be able to continuing offering this service.

Linder Foundation - End of Life Care in Prisons

Hospice UK identified that there is a need to develop greater awareness about frailty of older people in prisons. WH are working with the staff at Wakefield & New Hall prisons to provide training and support to identify when the person requires a referral to specialist palliative care.

Funding Round Up

This year we've had continued success from corporate foundations and very much enjoyed working with them to help secure the funding and joining them to celebrate their success.



Tesco; Community Grant Wakefield Hospice was honoured to have been awarded £1,500 from the Tesco community Grant to support Bereavement for children. This has enabled us to purchase more teddy bears such as Georgie. They are given to families with children and used as a tool to aid children to discuss their thoughts and feelings.

Asda Foundation Thank you to the Asda Foundation for the £500 donation to celebrate Her Late Majesty The Queen's platinum Jubilee.

Food Share Wakefield Hospice remains grateful to the ongoing partnerships both directly or via the Neighbourly Foundation as part of the food share initiative. Your donations have saved the hospice thousands of pounds, with the added bonus of reducing waste.

St James's Place Charitable Foundation We are so grateful to the St James Place for their support of Wakefield Hospices' Driving Away the Pain campaign. Their £2,500 grant has been used towards purchasing new syringe drivers. The syringe drivers are used on a daily basis to help with pain management. We are currently seeking funding to replace 17 drivers and lockboxes which will cost £27,009.60.

LED the way to a brighter future Thank you to our many funders, we have completed installation of the energy efficient lights and already started to save money on our energy bills.

Mills & Reeve kindly donated £450 which has been used in our garden.

Warburton's Charitable Foundation donated £400 to cover the cost of a digital copy of the Royal Marsden Clinical Procedures.

A quick call for help Through four generous grants we have been able to upgrade our nurse call system, making it easier for our patients to request help.

A special Christmas Dinner was provided to our in-patients thanks to a donation of £500 from On Stop Christmas fund, along with some gifts. This was on top of their £1,000 donation towards our Dementia Day Care service.

Time to Shine We have received one grant of £2,000 towards our time to shine initiative to install solar panels at Wakefield Hospice to reduce bills, make us more sustainable and reduce our carbon footprint. We are still looking for further funding as feel having solar panels will drastically reduce our energy costs meaning more funds would be available for patient care.

Virtual Beds and BAME After the last Trust in Us issue we received further funding for both virtual beds and BAME. Thank you as having these services means that Wakefield Hospice can reach more of our community.
